Another world

So how is your summer going? By now schools will have broken up and those eagerly anticipated summer holidays being enjoyed (flights permitting!)

I hope everyone is managing to stay safe and cool – writing this as I am, on the weekend of the amber / red weather warnings that are forecasting temperatures expected to reach 40 degrees!

I was actually able to beat the holiday rush and enjoy a summer break in Cornwall at the end of June. It gave me the chance of experiencing not only

a different world location wise, but also in an imaginary sense in that I immersed myself in a good book! Having heard excellent reviews about Richard Osman's first novel, I decided to enter into the world of 'The Thursday Murder Club'.....and was instantly hooked! Having taken me just three days to read, I immediately searched out a local shop to buy the sequel. Because that's what a good book can do – whisk you away to another realm, drawing you in to a new group of people and surroundings and events, that you feel very quickly part of and invested in.

However, such new imaginary communities, as well as being a means of enjoyment and escapism, can actually present interesting, thought-provoking questions to real-life issues and situations. Such as in 'The Man Who Died Twice' (the second book of 'The Thursday Murder Club' series), in which two of the characters (Joyce and Ibrahim) discuss death. For Joyce life is about happiness, whereas for Ibrahim, "everything is about death", and in imparting their different perspectives to the other, Joyce ends up talking about everything being 'blue'!

Interesting though Joyce's argument is, one of the deeper truths of life is that nothing is indeed black and white...... except, I would advocate, that we are all born in the image of our Creator God, who loves each one of us more than we will ever imagine. Having put His love into each one of us He has given us a world that is not imaginary, nor black and white but gloriously vibrant – a world to feel part of and invested in, to look after and love.... every single part of it.

And so, whilst I now await the release of the third book in 'The Thursday Murder Club' series, I pray that whatever your plans be this summer, you might be blessed along the way.

The Interviews for our new Interim Priest took place on Thursday 28th July. There were three candidates, and it was a full-on day with each one having to give a presentation on change management, followed by questions from the panel. The rest of the morning they spent some time with the MMU Clergy and Licenced Lay Ministers; had a tour of The Rectory and also went on a car tour taking in the churches at Greensted, Stanford Rivers, Bobbingworth, Moreton and St. Peter's Shelley.

In the afternoon the actual interviews took place before a panel made up of the Archdeacon, the Area Dean (in an advisory capacity), and six representatives from the various parishes.

Of course, the Interview Day is only one step in the process of appointing a priest and it will be some weeks before we are allowed to make an announcement – this is quite normal, and we shall all have to be patient just a little bit longer!

We should like to thank everybody involved in the recruitment process from those who drafted out the Parish Profile to all those who joined us on the day; some doing various tasks and others meeting the candidates and providing feedback to the Panel.

Dear Friends

I am sure most of you have heard of the Church Army. As a supporter and Parish representative since the 1980s, I place their quarterly magazines and prayer diaries on the "tardis". Church Army Evangelists work with the poor and marginalised throughout the UK and other area of the Anglican Church like Canada and Australia. Church Army was started 140 years ago by Wilson Carlisle in Sheffield who we can read about in this special edition of the magazine



One of Church Army's main works has been their hostels for the homeless for women started in 1922. In the 1990's our church congregation supported the Marylebone project. We supplied toilet articles and clothes for the women. Two loved members of our congregation, Charles and Ingrid Kellam (now deceased) drove to London with our collections.

Now the Marylebone Project is the largest hostel in London, hundreds of women each year seek help there finding shelter, friendship, guidance and hope.

Church Army's legacy of putting well-being as a paramount ingredient of showing the love of Jesus, still drives their cause today and in God's grace will continue for another hundred years to come .

I do hope you will read the Church Army Special Edition of its magazine. Of course, like most charities, Church Army relies on donations to continue their work.

A few years back I arranged a speaker for the 10.30 am service which was enjoyed by the congregation and there was a retiring collection Perhaps that is something we could repeat in the future, once we have a new Priest .?
